What is the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) Manchester Biomedical Research Centre?

The NIHR Manchester Biomedical Research Centre (BRC) is a partnership between Central Manchester University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust (CMFT) and The University of Manchester (UoM).

It brings together city-wide expertise to improve health by accelerating new research discoveries.

- 1. The Manchester BRC delivery partners are:
 - a. Central Manchester University Hospitals' NHS Foundation Trust (CMFT)
 - b. The Christie Hospital NHS Foundation Trust (The Christie)
 - c. Salford Royal NHS Foundation Trust (SRFT)
 - d. University Hospital of South Manchester NHS Foundation Trust (UHSM)
 - e. The University of Manchester

The NIHR Manchester BRC has been awarded £28.5m (April 2017-March 2022), to fund and support research and experimental medicine in the following areas:

- Musculoskeletal conditions
- Hearing health
- Respiratory medicine
- Dermatology
- Cancer Prevention and Early Detection
- Advanced Radiotherapy
- Cancer Precision Medicine

And to support research in the following cross cutting themes:

- Biomarker Platforms
- Informatics and Data Sciences
- Rapid Translation Incubator



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Supported by the Manchester Academic Health Science Centre (MAHSC), the BRC will deliver its research goals by applying the following principles:

- **Prevent** disease
- **Predict** disease progression
- Personalise treatment pathways
- Empower patients to **Participate** in their healthcare

The NIHR Manchester BRC Executive Group

Role of the NIHR Manchester BRC Executive Group

The BRC Executive Group is responsible for making decisions relating to the delivery of the BRC objectives. Some of the roles of the group are as follows:

- 1. To undertake operational monitoring of BRC projects, programmes and research themes
- 2. To ensure the delivery of the BRC objectives against milestones
- 3. To agree any major amendments to BRC objectives
- 4. To ensure adherence to NIHR contractual requirements

The group will be chaired by the NIHR Manchester BRC Director, Professor Ian Bruce. Its other members will include:

- The BRC Operations Manager
- The BRC Training Lead
- The BRC Patient Involvement and Patient/Public Engagement Lead
- The BRC Industry Lead

- The Manchester Clinical Research Facility Director
- Patient and public contributors
