1. Background

British Heart Foundation (BHF) is the largest funder of cardiovascular research in the UK with a current active research portfolio of over £450 million and an ambition to fund over £100 million of new research every year.

Funding pioneering research is at the heart of what we do. It is our core mission. It drives every breakthrough we've made, and every advance we will make in the future. It spans everything from prevention to transformational treatments, and **innovative new services**.

How we're innovating healthcare

As part of our extensive research funding portfolio, BHF invests millions of pounds into programmes to ensure that innovative new ways of delivering patient care are adopted across the UK.

We support healthcare innovation in different ways, including funding wider programmes of work, managing specific projects that address unmet needs and funding innovative projects through the **Healthcare Innovation Fund.**

Established in 2023, the 'Healthcare Innovation Fund' aims to support the implementation of research findings into practice, and to test new and innovative ways to deliver patient care for those living with or at risk of heart and circulatory conditions. Health Innovation is about *improving delivery of services* for patients with cardiovascular conditions and can include prevention as well as treatment.

Remit of the Healthcare Innovation Fund Committee

Established in 2023, the Healthcare Innovation Fund (HIF) Committee is responsible for reviewing and assessing applications submitted to the HIF and to advise BHF on the outcome (i.e. whether the project should be funded).

The Committee meets twice per year to assess the applications, and Committee recommendations are considered by BHFs Chief Scientific and Medical Officer in discussion with the HIF Committee Chair, to determine the final decision.

The Committee is made up of approximately 15 members, including clinical experts in Cardiovascular conditions (e.g., medical, nursing, allied health professionals), experts in health service innovation and digital health.

As well as the members listed above, it is important to ensure that Committee recommendations are informed by those affected by heart and circulatory conditions. We are therefore looking to recruit up to 15 'Patient Reviewers' to provide a patient/carer perspective on applications submitted to the fund.

In addition, *up to three* Patient Reviewers from this group will be appointed to the HIF Committee, to attend Committee meetings (where final recommendations are

determined) and represent the collective views of the Patient Reviewers. See <u>Section</u> <u>3</u>, for more information regarding these roles.

2. Why your involvement matters

The <u>BHF Strategy to 2030</u> demonstrates BHF's strong commitment to involving people affected by heart and circulatory conditions across all areas of our work. This includes opportunities for patients and the public to be involved in shaping our Health Innovation programmes.

By getting involved in the work of BHF as a patient, carer or family member, you will help ensure that BHF invests in innovative projects that will improve the delivery of services for people affected by or at risk of heart and circulatory conditions.



3. Introduction to the Patient Reviewer role

Purpose:

By involving Patient Reviewers in the Healthcare Innovation Fund, BHF ensures that people affected by heart and circulatory conditions can inform the funding recommendations made by the Healthcare Innovation Fund Committee.

Patient Reviewers will specifically provide written feedback on HIF applications and advise the HIF Committee on (including but not limited to):

- The quality of Plain Language Summaries
- The importance of the project to people affected by heart and circulatory conditions
- The commitment to/quality of patient and public involvement (PPI), both in the development of the application and proposed plans for ongoing involvement
- Any barriers to people with heart and circulatory conditions in the project delivery

In addition, up to three Patient Reviewers will be appointed as members of the HIF Committee. These 'HIF Committee representatives' are part of the wider group of Patient Reviewers and are responsible for attending and representing the collective views of the Patient Reviewers at Committee meetings.

Role:

The Patient Reviewer role is **home based**. Twice per year, you will be emailed a **maximum of 5** HIF applications to review and score, over a 4-week review period. *Each application* will be assessed by Peer Reviewers (i.e., professionals working in the relevant field), HIF Committee members, and 3 Patient Reviewers. We will try as far as possible to match applications to your experience of heart and circulatory condition(s).

Once you have emailed your completed reviews to the PPI Team, your comments and scores will help us to decide which applications are shortlisted for further discussion (at the HIF Committee meeting), and then recommended for funding.

Prior to the HIF Committee meeting, a summary of the key feedback points will be shared with the applicant, who will have the opportunity to submit a response (known as 'rebuttal'). Example responses may include agreeing to make amendments to the application and/or responding to the reviewers' comments with further explanation.

As a Patient Reviewer, you will:

- Review and score your allocated applications using the 'Patient Reviewer Form' provided, within the 4-week review period.
- Take responsibility to seek further information and guidance from the Patient & Public Involvement Team, as required.
- Respond in a timely manner to all relevant email communications.
- Provide ongoing feedback to help further develop and refine BHF's approach to involving patients and the public in the assessment of the research we fund.

If you are one of the **Patient Reviewers appointed to the HIF Committee ('HIF Committee representative')** you will *also*:

- Summarise and collate the *key points* from the Patient Reviews by completing the required feedback form, to be shared with applicants.
- Review applicant responses to feedback ('rebuttals')
- Prepare in advance for HIF Committee meetings (e.g., familiarise yourself with key points from the Patient Reviews, and whether applicants have been sufficiently receptive to feedback)
- Attend and contribute to HIF Committee meetings by representing the collective views of the Patient Reviewers and responding to queries from other Committee members.

Membership:

BHF are seeking to recruit **up to 15 Patient Reviewers** (including 3 HIF Committee representatives). All members will have a **personal experience of** a <u>heart or</u> <u>circulatory condition(s)</u>, either as a patient, carer and/or family member.

Appointments to the Patient Reviewer role will be for a period of **1 year in the first instance** (with the opportunity to be extended for 1 year if further funding rounds are announced).

Time Commitment:

Patient Reviewers will be asked to take part in two funding rounds for the Healthcare Innovation Fund. The expected review periods (when you will be asked to review and submit your feedback) will open in June and November 2024. As this is a home-based role, you may complete your reviews *any time* that suits you within the 4-week review period.

If you are appointed as a HIF Committee Representative, you will also be required to attend the HIF Committee meetings (23rd August 2024 and 10th February 2025). This will be a full day meeting held online (via Microsoft Teams).

Training and support:

As a Patient Reviewer for the HIF, you will be supported throughout your membership by BHF's Patient and Public Involvement Team and Healthcare Innovation Team, including the following key contacts:

All Patient Reviewers will be required to attend a virtual **'Induction Session'**, to introduce you to the role and equip you with the knowledge required. This is currently scheduled to take place from 13:00 – 16:00pm on <u>Wednesday 12th June 2024</u> (online via Microsoft Teams).

Remuneration:

An honorarium (payment for your time) will be offered for this role, in line with our <u>PPI</u> <u>Payment Policy</u>

Confidentiality:

Discussion and any materials shared with Patient Reviewers should be kept **strictly confidential.**

4. About you

BHF are seeking **enthusiastic and motivated patients**, **carers and family members** interested in becoming a Patient Reviewer for the HIF.

To be eligible to apply for this opportunity, you *must* have a personal experience of a <u>heart or circulatory</u> <u>condition(s)</u> either as a patient, carer or family member.



As a Patient Reviewer, you will:

- Be enthusiastic about healthcare innovation, and be willing to familiarise yourself with medical and research language (additional training and support will be provided)
- Be able to read and absorb information, and be confident in seeking further information and clarity where needed

- Have the ability to present your views in written form
- Be IT literate (e.g., applications and review forms will be sent via email)

It is *desirable* that *some* Patient Reviewers have:

• Links to others affected by heart and circulatory conditions e.g., through support groups, charities, PPI roles, family or friends (ability to represent views beyond your own experience)

If you are a Patient Reviewer appointed as a HIF Committee Representative, you will *also*:

- Be confident in attending and contributing to high-level meetings, to ensure that the views of the Patient Reviewers are represented
- Be confident in voicing your opinions clearly and be able to participate constructively and objectively in high-level meetings (e.g., alongside scientific and medical experts), whilst listening to and respecting differing opinions
- Be able to read and absorb information, and be able to summarise clearly and concisely

5. How to apply

Please note that in addition to applying for the Patient Reviewer role, you may indicate on the application form whether you would like to be considered for appointment as a 'HIF Committee Representative' (see <u>Section 3</u>).

Following the application deadline, those who are shortlisted will be contacted to arrange an **informal interview** (currently scheduled to take place on 29th, 30th and 31st May) to discuss the role further. Please note that we will let you know the outcome of your application whether you are shortlisted or not.
